April 11, 2015

Highlights from Week 10:

The week before “First Committee Passage,” is one of the busiest weeks during the 120-day legislative session. Legislators work with committee members, constituents and lobbyists to find agreement and write amendments that will garner support for their bills so they can be passed out of committee by the Friday, April 10 deadline. Lobbyists and legislative junkies are on constant alert for impromptu hearings, and committees hold meetings at all hours of the day and into the evening. The pace of First Committee Passage is something to behold.

Generally speaking, bills that aren’t passed out of committee by the deadline are considered “dead.” However, in legislative terms, there are many nuances of “dead” . . . see the “Did You Know” section at the end of this bulletin for tips of how you can tell how dead a bill really is.

After last week’s frenzy, legislators will take a deep breath this weekend and enjoy the cancellation of Monday morning meetings and floor sessions as they get ready for the next deadline, “First House Passage.” Bills that emerged from committees now go to the “floor” of either the Assembly or the Senate for a hearing and a vote before the April 21 First House Passage deadline.

Over the next ten days hundreds of bills will be heard on the both the Assembly and Senate Floors. As the deadline gets closer, it becomes more and more difficult to meet with legislators as they find the majority of their time will be spent on the Floor, debating and voting. Impromptu committee meetings will be held, sometimes with committee members huddled at the “bar of the assembly” or “bar of the senate” to consider amendments that might increase the chances of a bill passing. (Only elected officials are allowed on the floor of the assembly or senate without specific approval, so a “committee at the bar” requires the committee members to meet in an area where the public can hear the discussion of the committee. Often, these meetings are held at the juncture of the room where a velvet rope separates the floor from the observer’s gallery, known as the “bar.”) Bills that are amended and passed will come before their respective bodies for additional amendments, house passage, or will never be heard from again.

At the end of this document, please find the list of 71 bills on the CCSD tracking list that failed to meet Friday’s First House Passage deadline.

Here’s the day-by-day summary of the past week:

MONDAY, APRIL 6

Assembly Committee on Education

- ~ **AB421** creates the Spending and Government Efficiency Commission (SAGE Commission) to study K-12 public schools and the Nevada System of Higher Education on their financial efficiency. This bill was heard on Monday and passed by the Committee on Wednesday.
- ~ **AB447** delays the full implementation of the Nevada Educator Performance Framework until 2016-17 and changes the student achievement data requirement to 25% based on statewide assessments and 25% based on district assessments. The Teachers and Leaders Council recommended seven different amendments to the bill, including reducing the 50% student data requirement to 40%. None of the amendments were adopted when the bill was passed by the Committee on Friday.
- ~ **AB120**, which clarifies the rights of public school pupils regarding the free exercise of religion, was discussed in the work session portion of the meeting. The bill was amended heavily from its original version. As passed by the Committee, students would be allowed to freely exercise their religious beliefs as long as they do not disrupt the learning environment, affect other students in any way, and nor bully other students. The amendment also requires school districts to provide some sort of grievance process for student who feel their religious rights were not afforded to them.

TUESDAY, APRIL 7

Assembly Government Affairs

- ~ **AB445**, bill that would allow the City of Henderson to extend their Redevelopment Agency for another 15 years, was discussed during the work session. Due to complications in the law, the bill was amended to increase the scope of the bill to all RDAs in Clark County. CCSD is currently working with the bill sponsors to reduce the land area to prevent the large fiscal impact caused by the amended version of the bill.
- ~ **AB159** would prohibit government entities from discriminating or basing decisions on whether a contractor uses a union labor or not when providing a public works project. This bill will be move to the Assembly floor next week.

Senate Education

The Senate Committee on Education went late into the evening as they heard four bills and had five others scheduled for the work session.

- ~ **SB391**, the Governor's Read by 3 Bill, was created to ensure all students are reading at a 3rd grade level before being promoted to 4th grade. The bill requires retention of non-proficient third graders beginning in the 2020 school year. The bill also requires districts to hire a reading specialist in each school, provide more professional development to its teachers, as well as create a State approved reading plan for the entire school district. The bill was brought back up in a work session Thursday, April 9 where it was passed. A \$30 million allocation to support this program was included in the Governor's recommended budget.
- ~ **SB 405 and SB 430**, bills expanding the number of Zoom schools, are so similar that they were heard jointly, with sponsors of the bills sitting side by side during the presentation. The differences between the bills were minor, with the most notable being the Governor's version (SB430) called for expanding Zoom schools to 2 middle schools and 2 high schools and the Democrat's version (SB405) calling for expanding Zoom schools to 2 middle schools and 1 high school. Ultimately, the bills were merged into SB 405 and the language was changed to "at least 1 high school," leaving room to expand the program to 2 high schools if desired. The bill also increases the number of elementary schools that will receive Zoom funding. This highly-regarded program is also funded in the Governor's recommended budget.
- ~ **SB461** is a bill that will require individual graduation plans for students who cannot graduate in 4 years, providing the opportunity to complete high school shortly thereafter. The bill allows some leeway to the school districts should the student not be abiding by their graduation plan.
- ~ **SB503**, sponsored by the Governor and championed by First Lady Kathleen Sandoval, requires schools with 70% of the student population qualifying for free and reduced price lunch (FRL) to serve "Breakfast After the Bell." The bill includes a \$2 million allocation for startup costs for eligible school. CCSD currently has 76 schools the serve universal breakfast and this bill would expand the program to approximately 158 schools.

The Committee also passed the following bills during Tuesday's work session:

WEDNESDAY, APRIL 8

Assembly Government Affairs

- ~ **AB304** is a bill that would prohibit employers from practicing wage discrimination against women. The Committee appreciated the statement that the bill was trying to make, but it ultimately did not receive committee passage by the deadline.

Assembly Education

It was another late evening for the Assembly Committee on Education as members heard bills in order for them to pass and meet the Friday deadline.

- ~ **AB321** would allow charter schools to contract police services with their local school district if they so desire. The bill requires the school district to provide the services at cost. However, charter school must notify the district of their intent in a timely manner and the length of the contract must be for no less than 3 years.
- ~ **AB349** was presented by Assemblyman Gardner to allow teachers to develop their own lesson plans to meet the standards. The bill did not meet the deadline for first committee passage.

- ~ **AB374** was amended to align with the academic plan developed for all ninth grade students. Counselors will include the results of the college and career readiness assessment in these plans and discussions with students. The bill was heard, amended, and passed by the Committee.
- ~ **AB378:** A conceptual amendment that completely changed AB378 was presented during the hearing. The bill was rewritten to give charter schools part of the class size reduction funds currently allocated to traditional public schools but without the requirements to meet specific teacher to student ratios in kindergarten and grades 1-3. According to the amendment presented, these funds could also be spent on teacher incentives and other innovative programs. The bill was amended once again during Friday's work session to provide charter schools with the same per pupil allocation for all local, state, and federal funds as traditional public schools. AB378 passed out of committee with this provision.

During the work session portion of the meeting, the following bills were passed by the committee:

AB218 – Emergency management; Amend and Do Pass

AB234 – Multicultural education; Amend and Do Pass

Senate Legislative Operations

- ~ **SB 380**, a bill that would clarify what types of activities are allowable by school trustees and school district employees when a district has placed a ballot question before the voters, was heard. The committee took no action and the bill received a waiver on Friday to keep it alive for further consideration.

THURSDAY, APRIL 9

Senate Education

- ~ **SB509** may be the longest bill to come before the education committee this session. The bill makes multiple technical changes to the State Charter Authority and other charter school sponsors. The bill also creates statutes in order to allow for the arrival of Charter Management Organizations, which have interest in coming to Nevada to open schools. Finally, the bill clarifies ambiguities in the law regarding charter school closure and how those are to proceed should a school be closed for low performance.

FRIDAY, APRIL 10

Assembly Judiciary

- ~ **AB375** was re-referred to the Assembly Judiciary Committee and a hearing was held on Friday. This bill would require students to use the bathroom of their biological sex. Due to the limited time frame for the Committee, the hearing was limited to one and half hours and equal time was given for support and opposition. The bill was passed in a work session held Friday evening.

Assembly Education

- ~ **AB394**, the bill to deconsolidate the Clark County School District, was highly amended during the work session. The amended version creates a commission to study the issue during the interim, then immediately implement its recommendations by the beginning of the 2017-18 school year. If approved in its current form, this study will not

go back to the legislature for approval before it is implemented. The Commission shall be made up of legislators, city officials, a school board member, and consultant to be hired upon passage of the bill.

Want to Learn More?

In case you didn't know: How do I know if a bill is "dead?"

Bills may succeed or die in many ways during this process. Below is a quick way to determine if a bill you are following will still be in play come two Tuesdays from now.

- All bills need at least a majority of the members in that body to vote in favor of the measure. Some, if they involve revenues or expenditures of this state, will require a 2/3rds majority vote. Check your bill as posted on NELIS. The bill cover will notify you if it requires a 2/3rds vote.
- Is your bill exempt? Exempt bills are bills that require more than just a single committee passage. Mostly, bills become exempt because they require some financial backing from the state. Since budgets have not been determined, these exempt bills are not held to the usual deadlines and may be moved at the pleasure of the body whenever it so chooses. Leadership has the ultimate decision regarding which bills are exempt, so this designation can be more about politics than anything else.
- Your bill was just moved to the Chief Clerk's Desk. This is a procedural move that takes a bill off the current day's agenda for a vote and places it on the Chief Clerk's Desk to be held until instructed to be removed. For many bills that are placed on the desk, this is their final fate where they will sit until the deadline makes them obsolete. It takes a special motion from the body to remove a bill from the Chief Clerk's Desk so this tactic can be used to outright kill a bill or for the political purposes of leadership.

One final note regarding legislation and the fate of bills beyond a deadline: **no bill is ever truly dead.** The Legislature provides many opportunities to revive bills through amendments or emergency measures. So if that bill you are tracking finds its fate of failing a deadline, keep working. It is never over until the final gavel drops and it's time for the Nevada Legislature to *Sine Die*.
