Legislative Update CLARK COUNTY SCHOOL DISTRICT April 3, 2015

While the rest of the legislative building emptied out for Easter weekend, Senate Education forged on, adjourning at 8:19 PM on Friday night, ending Day 60, the halfway point of the 78th Session of the Nevada State Legislature. Next week brings a major deadline – First Committee Passage – so veterans of the process know that hearings next week will run long and late as bills are heard, amended, and passed out of committee before the April 10 deadline. Bills designated "exempt" – usually because they have a fiscal impact on the budget – do not have to meet this deadline. Next week's deadline begins the weeding process as bills "die in committee," either because they weren't given a hearing or don't have enough votes to pass out of committee.

Highlights from Week 9:

MONDAY, MARCH 30

Assembly Education

 AB394 – The Assembly Committee on Education heard AB394, a bill that would allow cities in Clark County to deconsolidate the Clark County School District by creating their own school precincts. The legislation would also allow smaller districts in the rural areas of Nevada to consolidate if they so choose. Specifically, the bill provides a process for cities in Clark County to create a plan that must be approved by the State Board of Education should they wish to separate from the Clark County School. The bill does not go into detail on how transportation, finances, and student services will be provided, nor how contractual issues would be handled. Much of the hearing centered on these ambiguities in the bill.

TUESDAY, MARCH 31

Senate Education Committee

- SB295 focuses on Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics (STEM) instruction across the state. SB295 requires the Nevada Department of Education to create a website displaying the different career paths STEM majors may take. The bill also provides for an appropriation to school districts to provide professional development to its staff in not only STEM but also for the new Nevada Standards in English, math and science.
- SB330, deals with two important issues that don't necessarily have anything to do with each other student athletics and the qualification of school nurses. Due to this difference as well as time contraints, the bill was actually split into two hearings. On Tuesday the Committee addressed the Nevada Interscholastic Activities Association (NIAA) portion of the bill. SB330 revised the eligibility of students who transfer to different schools for sports purposes. Specifically, the bill requires that if a student appeals the decision of the NIAA, they shall receive an independent hearing to review and conduct the proceedings. The nursing portion of the bill was scheduled for Friday, April 3rd.

Joint Hearing of Assembly and Senate Education Committees

At 5:00 p.m. a special joint hearing on two bills that propose changes to the statutes on bullying was held. The Governor's office introduced SB504 followed by impactful, emotional testimony from parents of children who had experienced bullying. SB504 redefines bullying, adds deadlines for reporting and investigating incidents as well as notifying parents, and mandates disciplinary measures for failure to report, notify, or investigate by the deadlines outlined. The District requested modifications to the bill to ensure clarity for the implementation of the bill's requirements. Late into the evening, SB204 was presented by Senator Parks and Assemblywoman Spiegel. This bill requires districts to provide assessment and counseling for suicide, allows a private cause of action against a school district, an employee or a volunteer for a breach of duty related to bullying, create safety plans for targets of bullying, and requires the Nevada Equal Rights Commission to establish policies and provide training.

WEDNESDAY, APRIL 1

Senate Health and Human Services

Well into the evening, SB394 was heard, a bill which requires the State Board of Education to include personal safety standards into the health curriculum. The bill establishes requirement for who can teach these standards and for the adoption of materials.

Assembly Education

- The Assembly Committee on Education had a busy evening hearing two very important bills. However, before they heard the two bills, the Committee also held a work session. During the work session they passed AB166, the bill that creates the State Seal of Bi-literacy Program and AB351, which allows more charter schools to qualify for facilities financing.
- AB303 After the work session the Committee heard AB303, a bill that would remove the current Nevada Academic Content Standards, otherwise known as Common Core. The Committee heard both sides of issue in depth, and the conversation was both educational and robust with so many speakers that two overflow rooms were needed for the hearing.
- AB341 The final bill heard by the Committee that night was AB341, a bill that would require additional services for those students who suffer from dyslexia. The bill would require school districts to screen all students for dyslexia, to hire a dyslexia interventionist at every school location, and also provide professional development for teachers so they can identify students with dyslexia and employ specific tactics in teaching students who suffer from the learning disability.

THURSDAY, APRIL 2

Senate Government Affairs

 AB445 – This bill would extend the Redevelopment Agency (RDA) for many of the cities across Clark County. As originally written, it was intended to only include projects in the city of Henderson. However, do to certain restrictions in the Nevada Constitution, the bill had to be expanded to include projects in North Las Vegas, Mesquite, and Boulder City. RDAs are a tool used by cities to improve blighted buildings and neighborhoods. By withholding some property tax dollars, this money is reinvested into the neighborhood hoping to attract businesses and more community projects into the area.

Senate Committee on Education

- Senate Education moved three bills out of committee on Thursday, including SB211 (amended to delete the mandatory school start times and to make ethnic studies an elective course), SB313, and SB390. Two bills that were originally scheduled, SB77 on turnaround school and SB432 on Victory Schools, were pulled from the agenda.
- The Committee also heard several bills for the first time. They considered SB463 on data privacy, SB13 on special education, and SB227 on a grant program for higher education.
- SB461 This bill would require all school districts to create an Individualized Graduation Plan for every student. Part of this plan is to help those students who are not on track to graduate in 4 years. The bill allows for school districts to continue helping students graduate beyond the 4 years as long as the student continues to abide by their graduation plan.

FRIDAY, APRIL 3

Senate Education

- SB330, Part 2 The Senate Committee on Education continued the hearing on SB330 on Friday afternoon. The school-nursing portion of the bill changes the qualifications for people wanting to be a school nurse. The bill still would require applicants to be fully licensed as a nurse and would also still require a bachelors degree. To be hired by a school district, the applicant would not have to pass any teacher-specific test such as the PRAXIS or Nevada Constitution.
- SB460 creates in statute an alternative performance framework for schools that serve at least 75% of students that have been expelled, have behavioral issues, or are academically disadvantaged.
- SB302 is a bill sponsored by Senator Hammond that would establish a program for children to receive funds from their district's per-pupil funding to enroll in a private school. The bill would require students to take standardized exams to demonstrate academic progress.
- SB474 is a bill that establishes the Teaching and Leading Fund, one of Governor Sandoval's bills to establish a "New Nevada." Regional Professional Development Programs (RPDP), school boards, charter schools, education associations, nonprofit organizations, and higher education institutions would be allowed to apply for grants to be used for professional development.
