Legislative Update CLARK COUNTY SCHOOL DISTRICT Saturday, May 23, 2015

With only 10 days left in the session, everyone is in high gear and working long hours. There are no meetings tomorrow (Sunday), but it is probably the last day until sine die without legislative activity. Friday's major deadline brought numerous floor sessions, marked by lengthy and unpredictable recesses. Around midnight, both houses announced they agreed that the second house deadline would be extended until 6 a.m. The Senate finished its business and adjourned at 1:31 a.m.; the Assembly adjourned about 30 minutes later.

Two bills on our list died yesterday: AB117 (school bus rental) and AB312 (a PERS bill).

The next deadline is on Wednesday, May 27 when bills that have been designated as "exempt" must emerge from committee. We expect another busy week as those bills are scheduled for hearings.

Assembly Committee on Education

- SB405 The bill that would double funding for Zoom Schools was heard. Districts presented information about how existing Zoom funding is used and discussed the effectiveness of the program.

TUESDAY, MAY 19

Assembly Committee on Ways and Means

- AB221 requires the Department of Education and school districts to develop a "data Dictionary" to post the types of data collected on students.
- AB299 The Assembly Committee on Ways and Means heard AB299, a bill that will allow for the creation of Military Charter Schools. The bill was heavily revised from its original form and will focus mainly on expanding the Junior Reserve Officer Training Corps.
- SB474 The Great Teachers and Leaders bill was once again supported by numerous education advocates who recognize this bill will provide teachers and administrators with opportunities for professional development.

Assembly Committee on Education

- SB432 creates the designation of Victory Schools and authorizes services for schools serving a high percentage of students living in poverty. Victory Schools will be designated by the Department of Education. An amendment proposed by Assemblywoman Dina Neal would allow school districts to submit a letter of intent by the August 15 deadline, allowing districts access to the funds at the beginning of the school year while giving additional time to develop the full implementation plan for each school.

Senate Education

SB92 – The intent of this bill, sponsored and presented by Lieutenant Governor Mark Hutchison, is to ensure students have access to the best teachers. The bill also has language that was formerly in SB77, creating Turnaround Schools, incorporated into it.

Assembly Ways and Means

- SB503 expands Breakfast after the Bell programs to schools with 70% or more of their students qualifying for the Free and Reduced Price Breakfast program. The bill was supported by school districts and the Department of Education and opposed by NPRI. The Committee suspended the rule of waiting 24 hours to vote on a measure and passed the bill.

As we reach the end of the 2015 Legislative session, it is important to remember that the process of governing is inherently a people driven process. While it is the legislators themselves who are ultimately responsible to push the process forward, there are hundreds of dedicated people, rarely seen, who impact the outcome of the session. Each legislator has his or her own personal staff. This attaché schedules appointments, keeps the legislator's work organized, and assists with many other services. Additionally, each committee also has a support team, who makes sure the committee meetings run efficiently, prepare the materials needed, and provide support to lobbyists and constituents who are in attendance. They also prepare the minutes of the meetings.

The Legislative Council Bureau (LCB) may be the most important cog in the legislative process other than the legislators themselves. LCB has three primary segments – the Legal Division, the Fiscal Division and the Research Division. The Legal Division writes the actual language in the bills and ensures the legality of the bills. The Fiscal analysts prepare budgets at the direction of the legislature. The Research Analysts ensure the committee chairs and other legislators have access to accurate and current information on a wide variety of topics. In spite of the intense and stressful demands of a legislative session, these individuals remain professional and courteous as they assist legislators and ensure the work of the body is correctly done. Truly, without them and the historical knowledge they provide, the State would suffer.

The Nevada Legislature also requires police service to ensure everyone's safety, and workers who keep the legislative building a clean and historical museum that all Nevadan's can be proud of. This is another group of dedicated and friendly individuals. And finally, there are the constituents, lobbyists, and concerned citizens who help push and prod the process to its conclusion. Without all of these people, Nevada's government wouldn't exist. Getting the amount of work done in such a short time takes smart, dedicated people working together. This amalgamation truly is the embodiment of the state's founding vision of a citizen legislature.
